1999 Special Program on WTO Agreement and International Trade

1999 Special Course on WTO Agreement and International Trade, hosted by the School of Public Policy and Global Management, KDI and sponsored by the Korea International Cooperation Agency, was held from September 28 to October 17 at the KDI School, Seoul.

This program was sponsored by the Korea International Cooperation Agency and has been designed to provide mid-career government officials and international experts from developing countries with the most advanced and updated theories and information on practical issues in the areas of international trade and the WTO agreement and to train them in trade related policy making and management skills in this era of unlimited competition and globalization.

This program offered a series of seminars and lectures on international law and trade, WTO agreement and implementation, dispute settlement cases, anti-dumping cases, and Korean economic development and crisis and its aftermath.

There we re 25 participants from 18

different countries, who came together for a series of lectures and a number of field trips to industrial complexes and other cultural, historical sites around Korea. At the end of the program, participants presented and held a discussion session on their country report on international trade issues and the WTO agreement and its implementation. Lectures were given by 15 lecturers, who were enowned international lawyers, scholars, experts, and KDI School faculty members.

Participants were selected on the basis of their current fields, mainly international trade, and English proficiency. According to the staff members who helped out during the program, participants commented that it was a very tightly scheduled program but of great use and help.

Our Global Connection for Innovative Leadership and Global Competence

and Sang-Hyuk Cho--students from our School--are now studying at the sunny campus of the University of California, San Diego. Myug-Kyun Kim and Joo-Hyung Chung are now living in Jonkoping, Sweden. And two German gentlemen—Jan Plogmann and Timo Seiling-will be taking classes with our students in spring, 2000. Some other students are now preparing to leave for Michigan. These are the beginnings of our School's global connection.

As an institution, which educates leaders who deal with the challenges of the world, our *School's strategic plan* includes establishing global connections in education, research and professional practice.

First of all, our School is setting up academic exchange programs

with educational institutions with which we share a common vision. At present, we have agreement with University of California at San Diego, USA; Michigan State University, USA; Jonkoping International School of Business, Sweden; Leipzig Graduate School of Management, Germany; and China Scholarship Council. We also have informal relationships with universities in Spain and Japan where we can send our students. In the coming years, we shall establish official linkages with other institutions around the world-in each region and continent. We will be selective in our effort--focusing on a small number of institutions which can be our intellectual co-producer in graduate education. Eventually, the School plans to provide global educational opportunities for all students. Under this scheme, all of our graduates will be able to possess innovative leadership and global competence.

Our School also has ongoing ties with academic societies abroad. We work closely with KAEA (Korea-America Economic Association) and the Global Group of the Association of Collegiate Schools of Planning and International Regional Science Association. We will expand our exchange with other aca-

demic and professional societies to gain knowledge and information about research and practice.

We participate regularly and officially in major international educational associations. We work with AIEA (Association of International Education Administrator); EAIE (European Association of International Education); NAFSA (National Association of Foreign Students Affairs): and AMPEI (Mexican Association of International Education). At the meetings of these organizations, we present our School's model of education, collect information on progresses made in other nations and explore possibilities for cooperation and exchange.

At out School we abandon the old model of "Either-Or" in international education—you study either in Korea or abroad. Our model is "Both-And"—we offer the best of "both domestic and global education." —*

SPECIAL PROGRAM: FORUM ON REFORM OF GOVERNANCE SYSTEM OF INSURANCE COMPANIES IN KOREA

A two day long 'Forum on Reform of Governance System of Insurance Companies in Korea", hosted by the Executive Leadership & National Development Programme of the KDI School and sponsored by the Korea Non-life Insurance Association and the Korea Life Insurance Association, was held during September 17 ~ 18, 1999 at the Oak Valley Resort.

Some 70 CEOs, directors, and auditors from 35 insurance companies in Korea participated in this forum during which they shared ideas and discussed how to employ an efficient governance system of the board of directors and the organization.

The objective of this meeting was to suggest new directions for the corporate governance system of insurance companies as the new outside directors system is introduced in the face of restructuring and economic reform.

Lectures and seminars were prepared by renowned nembers of the field; Mr. Dong-Chul Cho from KDI; Mr. James Rooney from Templeton Trust and Investment Management; Mr. Gun-sang Chang from the Ministry of Finance and Economy; Mr. Andrew Morlet and Mr. Robert Felton from McKinsey; Mr. Jin-won Park from Sejong Inc.; Mr. Steve Brain from the

World Bank; and Mr. Yves Guerard from the International Actuarial Association.

This forum provided the participants with opportunities to better understand the role of insurance companies and their directors within the Korean economy. They also participated in a mock board of director meeting and discussed the internal structure of the board and the need for efficient governance.

FACULTY COLUMN

International Schools in the Global Age

Over the past few years, as a faculty member at INSEAD, an international business school in Fontainebleau, France, I have had the unique opportunity to assess a model for education in cross-national world. Our model at IN-SEAD has been quite successful, judging by the popularity of our programs, and its main strength has been the real international spirit of our programs. For us, the international spirit permeates all aspects of our activity, including such issues as our admissions policy, our ecruitment of faculty and staff, and our curriculum. I do believe that the potential of our approach to education in the 'global village' has even more to offer.

Only a few hours after arriving in Seoul, one realizes the revolutionary process taking place in Korea at the end of the twentieth century. If some of this is driven by the post-crisis atmosphere, and may fade away once the urgency of servicing foreign debt declines, a large part of it represents a real x-

knowledgement of changes that are necessary to bring about a modern system, capable of bringing the country to its role in the 'global economy' of the twenty-first century. A major component of this revolution seems to be openness and liberalization, not only of the government and the economy, but more importantly of the private sector and other social players and forces. Measures that open access to foreign direct investment, for example, are not only a financial attempt to increase wealth, but represent a real change in the role of international forces in Korean society. The goal should be to make the country a real player in the world arena, by leadership and commitment, instead of a mercantilist beneficiary of export markets.

From this perspective, my experience at the KDI School, over the last few weeks, has truly impressed me, not only for its potential as a leading school in the region and maybe the world, but mostly for the visionary leadership that it seems to bring to Korean society, in terms of its focus on international and cross-cultural references. The mission of the KDI School is paramount in the advent of the new Korea. and internationalization of the country's intellectual and administrative structures. Moreover, the School seems well equipped, with a student body with outstanding intellectual and leadership skills, and a faculty committed to a true multicultural learning environment. In the age of Globalization, the provision of education in such a cross-national environment is a key ingredient for success, which will greatly benefit those that will be fortunate to take part in the process of building the School.

But the true beneficiaries will be Korea and the Asian region, as it prepares for a century that will be quite different from the last fifty years. The demand for new cross-national, multicultural, global education in Asia has brought even INSEAD to the region, as we prepare to open a campus in Singapore. The new century will mean a new and different way of working, doing business, and thinking in Asia, the innovators of today in the region will be the leaders of tomorrow.

Conference held at the Hotel Shilla on October 25, 1999.

Democratic leaders around the world attended this conference, including President Kim Dae-jung of Korea, who gave a keynote address at the Opening Ceremony of this three day long session, to express their support for the causes of peace and democracy, and call for international efforts to promote

In his paper, Prof. You clearly them. identifies the problematic consequence of the economic crisis in Korea, namely rising income inequality and poverty. He finds that the proximate cause for this is the economic recession and thus a rise in joblessness, but that the more fundamental cause is the structural changes induced by globalization. He then discusses the role of democracy in generating social responses to the problems of inequality and poverty, and reviews the limitations in the democratization process and the development of social policies in Korea. As a solution, Prof. You introduces a concept of "productive welfare", proposed by the Kim Dae-jung administration, which 'seeks simultaneous elevation of productivity and welfare of all people by enabling their human development', emphasizing fair and competitive market order and equal access to education, knowledge, and information.
