Security in Supply Chain Infrastructure: Can Supply Change Maintain its Efficiency after 9-11-01?

States inheavy damage only to the physical infrastruc-

ture, but more seriously it raised serious doubts whether the U.S. economy would sustain a healthy recovery. Wall Street reacted negatively and the consumer's confidence in the economy skydived after the incident.

Successful implementation of supply chain management is desirable because the cost of supply chain is huge, over one trillion dollars in the United States, over 10.2% of the GDP (in Korea, it is reported that the supply chain cost is 16.3% of the GDP). Supply

chain on many occasions achieves two results: to improve the consumer's (customer's) value by shortening the cycle time, eliminating errors, improving on-time delivery rate with the right products and the right quantity, and reducing

inventory. (The total annual inventory in the United States in 2000 is \$1.5 trillion. almost a huge amount). Secondly, supply chain optimization also claims, and does in many cases enhance, the in shareholder's value by an efficient and effective supply chain infrastructure. Supply chain strategy if implemented properly, creates a business model, which yields a least not cost business process (efficient model), such as the Dell Business Model (or direct business model). Any supply chain glitches whether such glitches were acts of terrorists, organized strikes like we just experienced in Korea, or natural disasters,

therefore, creates negative financial rewards (it is reported that any supply chain glitches in the U.S. has brought an average 8.6% loss of its value in the stock market).

The aftermath of 9-11-01 will remain with us for sometime, which requires re-orientation and reevaluation of two fundamental reward systems that supply chain optimization tries to achieve; improvement of the consumer's value and enhancement of the shareholder's market value. It is the opinion of experts that the second requirement (shareholder's value) can be achieved by solving the first requirement (consumer's value). The stock market will respond favorably once it recognizes that consumers have

returned with confidence, which signals an imminent mass consumption of durable goods. Shareholder's value will be enhanced.

What are some of the strategies to keep the consumer value intact and enhanced? Even after the 9-11-01 events, supply chain practitio-

ners have been trying to provide the same level of services to their clients (including ultimate consumers). However, supply chain practitioners cannot maintain such a level of service with so many barriers for efficient and effective supply chain operations. The only feasible solution at this time seems to be that clients should be served by several medium size distribution centers rather than few super distribution centers. The total warehousing capacity may remain the same. But the structure will be de-centralized near to their ultimate and best clients. Under this scenario, JIT concept still can be applicable. However, supply chain partners need much closer coordination/cooperation than ever before based on trust and commitment. A better information structure and forecasting methods may build trust among and between the supply chain partners, which eventually leads to commitment to their business plan and models.
