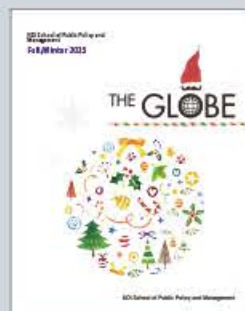

2015 GLiMPSE Seminar: ESSEC Business School, France

Following up on the GLiMPSE seminar held in March by KU Leuven in Belgium, ESSEC Business School invited affiliates of its partner schools to visit France from October 21st to 23rd. As the Korea-EU Education Project is underway, partner schools (KDI School, Seoul National University Graduate School of International Studies, ESSEC Business School, and KU Leuven) came together to discuss issues concerning student exchanges and internal administration.

On the first day of the seminar, Professor Anne-Claire Pache, Dean of Academic Affairs, and Professor Christian Koenig, Associate Dean of International Relations, and Professor Charles Cho greeted the guests from the partner schools. ESSEC is a private business school established around 100 years ago that aims to foster global business leaders with academic excellence, an entrepreneurial mindset and humanistic values. Afterwards, Professor Radu Vranceanu, former Dean of Research, and Professor Herve Bourdais joined the discussion on developing research collaboration.

Professor Vranceanu described ESSEC as a major research institution in France, and each of its academic field possesses autonomy in research. In relation to research collaboration, Professor Bourdais further explained one of the research programs at the Institute for Research and Education on Negotiation (IRENE) called the CODEV (companies and development) program.



The program aims to study to what extent and under what criteria companies can contribute to the sustainable development of areas where they operate, especially in areas of great poverty and/or social fragility. It basically investigates their ethical and political responsibilities, as well as how companies can contribute to regional development and impact social environments, and how they should change their business practices in order to ensure long-term sustainability in emerging countries.

The second day of the seminar started with the project meeting amongst affiliates from partner organizations. Ms. Patricia Moreau, project adviser from the European Commission, attended the meeting as an advisory panel member to monitor the progress of the project. The afternoon session was filled with events held by Korean Student Association. Students who are interested in Korea and Korean culture participated as audience members. Korea Student Association shared their views on the similarities and differences between the two cultures. Both the two Korean partners participated in the event to introduce the GLiMPSE program as well as their schools.

On the last day of the seminar, KDI School affiliates visited KU Leuven in Belgium for an additional information session for Belgian students interested in the GLiMPSE program. The official schedule of the meeting ended with a dinner event with students from KDI School and Seoul National University studying at KU Leuven. Overall, students from both ESSEC and KU Leuven showed high satisfaction regarding the quality of education as well as their living environment.

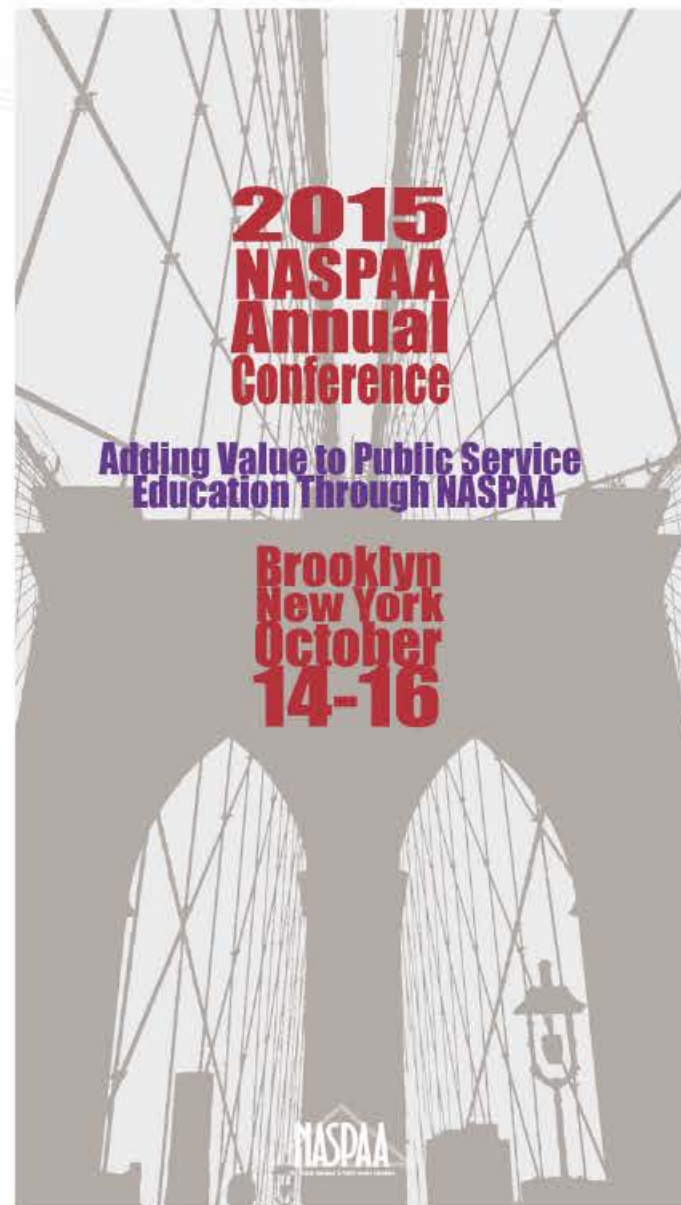
The next GLiMPSE seminar will be held at Seoul National University in March 2016.



2015 NASPAA Annual Conference



From October 14th to 16th, Associate Dean Kwon Jung, MPP Program Chair Jaeun Shin, Professor Booyeol Kim, and Head Eunhong Lee from the Academic Affairs Division attended NASPAA (Network of School of Public Policy, Affairs & Administration) Annual Conference in Brooklyn, New York, the United States. The main purpose was to share our resources with NASPAA and NASPAA's vision of quality public service education. Professor Shin led the session as a panel member with the subject of "Track Question on Data: How Do You Connect Policy Problems with Data Analysis and Use Evidence-Based Approaches to Improve the Education of Students and the Impact of Our Research?" Associate Dean Jung and MPP Program Chair Shin have been taking significant roles in NASPAA as a member of NASPAA standards Committee and a member of Commission on Peer Review and Accreditation (COPRA). KDI School analyzed the trends of NASPAA to promote NASPAA accreditation of KDI School's MDP and MPM programs. Throughout the 2015 NASPAA Annual Conference, KDI School demonstrated itself as accredited foundation in NASPAA by providing significant knowledge which contribute to the advancement of NASPAA.



MOU with the University of Sussex on Global Knowledge Sharing Initiative



K-Developedia signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Institute of Development Studies (IDS), a leading international development research institute based in the University of Sussex.

The MOU details the commitment of both organizations to work together to address inequalities in the visibility and accessibility of diverse and credible research knowledge, and was signed during a visit to IDS by KDI School staff who took part in the IDS's Global Open Knowledge Hub (GOKH) partner meeting held in October at the IDS.

Supporting the sharing of research globally

The MOU confirmed the participation of K-Developedia in the IDS-led GOKH project as the latest organization to join a group of international partners working collectively to support the adoption of Open Access and Open Data approaches in the sharing of research evidence.

Speaking of KDI School's reasons for joining the project, Hye-Kyung Chung, Head of K-Developedia Team at KDI School,

said: "The collaboration with IDS comes as an opportunity to widen the availability of K-Developedia and its resources to increase the redistribution of our resources all over the world."

Kelly Shephard, who heads the GOKH project, welcomed the agreement. "We're very excited to have the opportunity to work with KDI School. They deliver very high quality service through K-Developedia and clearly bring a great deal of high quality content and technical expertise to the project. We're really looking forward to learning more about the particular sectors and contexts that they work in and sharing IDS and the GOKH partners' experience of delivering similar services in other areas."

9th Global Development Learning Network Global Board Meeting

From September 1st to 3rd, 2015, the 9th GDLN Global Board Meeting was held at the Rockefeller Foundation's Bellagio Center in Italy, hosted by KDI School of Public Policy and Management. The GDLN Secretariat is comprised of five regional representatives, two World Bank staff, and five independent board members. Nine experts, including the board members and observers, participated in the meeting.

Since the first meeting held in Colombo, Sri Lanka, on November 2010, it has taken place in countries around the world such as Tanzania, Mexico, Turkey, and Korea. The board meeting is held annually to discuss ways of improving the GDLN Global and its regional affiliates and to evaluate their activities and outcomes. Especially in the ninth meeting, the board designed a new Action Plan for reinvigoration of the GDLN Global and for extension of the network.



On the first day, the meeting commenced with the introduction of new board members by KDI School. It was followed by updates from the GDLN regional board members and the best practices from each region (Africa, Asia-Pacific, Europe and Central Asia, Latin America and Caribbean, and South Asia). Despite strong contributions and leadership by affiliates across regions, the board found that variation of development and participation has polarized. The Secretariat presented a summary of the GDLN Affiliate Self-Assessment Survey which was conducted in June 2015.

In the afternoon session, the board has agreed on the following actions to revitalize the network and discussed how to encourage the contribution of certain affiliates or regions. The GDLN's value proposition was also readdressed, with the three objectives for sustainable development: access to expertise and experiences for development; global reach to disseminate knowledge in a cost effective way; and support for international cooperation.

The future global positioning of GDLN and its next steps were also discussed in the following days. The board divided into groups to review the action plans and make new drafts. Then they developed target members of prospective GDLN affiliates to participate in the GDLN Global Meeting in Seoul.

They also planned an affiliation strategy and global programs to strengthen the GDLN network in more effective way. Prior to this, global programs have been investigated over the past year in the area of knowledge exchange and environmental management. The board encouraged all affiliates to embrace innovation and new technology in the design and to deliver the programs.

The Secretariat has agreed to host a GDLN Global Meeting in July 2016 in Seoul, Korea. It will also incorporate the next board meeting and other regional meetings if required. The tentative agenda for the GDLN Global Meeting will include discussions on GDLN global branding, affiliate and program performance, technological enhancements, and professional development.

China NDRC Agricultural Public Administration Training Program

KDI School held the Rural Public Service System, which is the training program for 22 Chinese government officials of the National Development and Reform Commission (NDRC), from October 12th to 19th, 2015. KDI School shared Korea's development experiences and the current situation of rural public administration with the participants. The Rural Public Service System is a follow-up program from last year's China NDRC Training courses. KDI School received a request from Chinese government to plan this event for fostering friendly relations between Korea and China.

The Rural Public Service System had a total of eight different lectures: "Agriculture Development Policy" by Professor Jung Sub Choi from Pusan National University, "New Village Movement in South Korea" by Do Hyun Han from



the Academy of Korean Studies, "The 6th Industry as Agriculture" by Dr. Taegon Kim from Korea Rural Economic Institute, "The Role of

the Government for Rural Development" by Dr. Chang Young Kang from Korea Rural Economic Institute, "Improving the Living Standards of the Farmers" by former Head of the International Education at Korea Human Development Institute for Health & Welfare, Dr. Young Ae Shin, "Agriculture-Food Safety Programs" by Professor Yo Han Yoon from Sookmyung Women's University, and "Agriculture Product Distribution Network and E-commerce" by Dr. Byung

Yul Kim from Korea Rural Economic Institute.

The Chinese officials were interested in topics such as food safety authentication systems, quality control for agricultural products, agricultural product distribution networks and the E-commerce system of Korea.

The Chinese officials have requested KDI School to hold lectures on Korean economic development and macroeconomic policies in the near future. They also hoped to be briefed on Korean society and culture. In addition to these introductory sessions, the visitors also mentioned that it was a great opportunity to see detailed presentation on policy making, decision-making, and practical implementations.

As for the visit to certain public organizations, the officials were relatively more interested in the operational status of the Garak-dong Agricultural & Marine Products Market and its modernization process, as well as in the field trip to large-scale auction and wholesale markets. These field trips and visits were rated positively, and they hoped to visit more of the governmental organizations later on.

Policies for Development: The OECD Development Centre at Work

Kilton Jose Luis Lauter Portugal (2014 MDP, Mozambique)



In general, the course covered the performance of emerging or developing countries in the changing world economy and their new challenges to ensure sustainable and inclusive growth. The course focused on emerging development issues, as highlighted in the centre's recent editions of its flagship reports and the tools which the Development Centre employs. The lectures also served as a medium for the presentation of evidence and new findings on current issues concerning development

KDI School of Public Policy and Management offered "Policies for Development: The OECD Development Centre at Work" course during the Pre-Fall Session, from August 24th to September 4th, 2015. Course instructors for each unit included: Ms. Alexa Tiemann (Multi-Dimensional Country Reviews), Mr. David Khoudour (Migration and Skills) and Mr. Alexandre Kolev (Social Cohesion). Approximately 22 students, including three Japanese participants from CAMPUS Asia Summer Program, attended the course, which was delivered on a daily basis. The purpose of the course was to present the work of the OECD Development Centre in the field of public policies for development using evidence-based research conducted by the centre in the form of annual reports, country studies, policy briefs and working papers.

policies. These include: the link between migration and development, policies on social cohesion and impact evaluation, and the importance of institutions.

Throughout the course, the students delivered group presentations. Each group was assigned a country and asked to conduct a concise status report. The presentations covered outcomes for various indicators and dimensions, described the situations of each country, and developed recommendations for priority areas regarding policy measures.

In summary, this course was a good opportunity for participants to increase their knowledge based on the OECD Development Centre's work as it pertains to the field of public policies for development.

KDI School Special Lectures

Shokhrukh Normurodovich Avazov (2014 MDP, Uzbekistan)

1 Determinants of the Value of the Yen: From Plaza Accord to Abenomics

Lecturer: SaangJoon Baak, Waseda University

The Fall 2015 Special Lectures Series started on September 23rd, 2015. The first lecture was offered by Dr. Saang Joon Baak, a Professor at the School of International Liberal Studies at Waseda University (Japan). In his lecture titled "Determinants of the Value of the Yen: From the Plaza Accord to Abenomics," Professor Baak addressed the financial trends facing the Japanese currency and how they have impacted Japan's economic growth. Moreover, the speaker also discussed the causes for the yen-dollar exchange rate fluctuations and the current government fiscal policies, helping to broaden KDI School students' knowledge of the Japanese economy.

2 The Option Value of Human Capital: Higher Education and Wage Inequality

Lecturer: Sang Yoon (Tim) Lee, University of Mannheim

On October 1st, 2015, Dr. Sang Yoon (Tim) Lee, a Professor at the University of Mannheim (Germany), delivered a special lecture on "The Option Value of Human Capital: Higher Education and Wage Inequality." His engaging presentation revolved around the unique research question, "Are too many or too few students going to college in the United States of America?" As part of his presentation, Professor Lee provided statistical evidence that his model helps reconcile the trends in college enrollment and graduation and their labor market outcomes. Professor Lee concluded his lecture with a discussion with students about whether college students should stop pursuing degrees, given the number of graduates shown to be working in non-degree-requiring jobs.

3 Much of the 'Economics of Property Rights' Devalues Property and Legal Rights

Lecturer: Geoffrey Hodgson, Hertfordshire Business School

On October 14th, 2015, Dr. Geoffrey Hodgson, a Professor at the Hertfordshire Business School (United Kingdom), gave a lecture defending the opinion that "Much of the 'economics of property rights' devalues property and legal rights." Professor Hodgson hosted a discussion on the distinction between possession and property, the economics of property rights or law and human motivation, evaluating the ideas put forward by a variety of scholars and economists. At the final stage of his lecture, he stressed that rule of law, registration and enforcement of property rights are crucial for economic development.

4 International Tax Regime: Current Issues and Challenges

Lecturer: Jung-hong Kim, Ministry of Strategy and Finance

Another special lecture was given on October 15th, 2015, by Dr. Jung-hong Kim, a specialist with the Ministry of Strategy and Finance, on the topic "Introduction to International Tax Regime: Current Issues and Challenges." Dr. Kim introduced the audience to the world of international tax policy issues that are arising from the trade of goods and services, royalties, interest rates, dividends and pensions. He also talked about the organizations that influence and set guidelines for international tax regulations, concluding his lecture with a discussion on development issues related to tax regimes.

5 Accelerating Solutions Through Learning: Introducing The Open Learning Campus

Lecturer: Susan Shen and Sheila Jagannathan, World Bank

The next special lecture was delivered by World Bank Group specialists Susan Shen and Sheila Jagannathan on October 26th, 2015. The main message of the lecture was "Leadership, Learning and Innovation as Accelerators of Development." The two high-level specialists discussed how World Bank projects have succeeded at increasing knowledge capacity in developing countries in all sectors of education. An in-depth explanation of the e-Learning program was offered in the interest of presenting attendees with an extra source of knowledge.

6 Selection and Incentive Effects of Financial and Career Incentives on Labor Productivity: Evidence from a Field Experiment in Malawi

Lecturer: Hyuncheol Bryant Kim, Cornell University

On October 28th, 2015, Hyuncheol Kim, a Professor at Cornell University, shared his knowledge and experience in the economic analysis of labor productivity in Malawi. Professor Kim discussed his field experience regarding data collection and the analysis of workers in Malawi, where he enlightened students on research methodology. Specifically, Professor Kim talked about the impacts of offering financial incentives, which attract workers with stronger cognitive skills, as compared with career incentives, which attract workers with strengths in non-cognitive skills. He ended his lecture with the conclusion that workers attracted by financial incentive (with stronger cognitive skills) performed better during the training, while those attracted by career incentive (with stronger non-cognitive skills) performed better in the field.

7 Challenges and Prospects of the Korean Economy

Lecturer: Kim Choongsoo, Former Governor of the Bank of Korea

The next enlightening lecture was given by Choongsoo Kim, the former Governor of the Bank of Korea, on the theme of "Challenges and Prospects of the Korean Economy." His presentation on November 6th, offered a simple and informative history on Korean economic development. Moreover, Mr. Kim shared his experience working in the Bank of Korea and also emphasized what policy initiatives brought Korea its current OECD member status. He closed his lecture with a message about the challenges currently facing the Korean economy and made a series of policy recommendations for how to help resolve them.

8 Migrant Crisis of Europe: Analysis and Prospect

Lecturer: Dr. Myeong Chin Cho, member of the Security Experts Group, European Commission

The last special lecture for the Fall semester was given on November 27th, 2015, by Dr. Myeong Chin Cho, Security Expert at the European Commission, on the topic "Europe's Migrant Crisis: Is There Such a Thing as a Common EU Refugee Policy?" Dr. Cho discussed EU refugee policies, why member countries have different views on this agenda and both the convergences and divergences in problem-solving approaches among them. He went on to show statistical evidence about refugee migration in recent years and explained which institutions are in charge of refugees in the European Union as a whole. In conclusion, Dr. Cho noted that the migrant agenda has played a role in dividing EU member policies and creating divisions among them.

2015 KOREA FIELD RESEARCH AND STUDY

The Korea Field Research and Study (KFRS) is an annual four-day field trip organized by KDI School to offer international students an opportunity to learn about other aspects of Korea's social, cultural and industrial sectors. This year's field study took place from August 18th to 21st, 2015. Looking back, the trip was a truly educational, enlightening and eye-opening experience that helped attendees discover new facets of the Korean development story. The students visited Hyundai Heavy Industries, Pohang Iron and Steel Company (POSCO), Daewangam Park, Gyeongju Cultural Heritage, the Yangdong Folk Village, and the Samsung Smart City. The participants visited several historic cultural heritage sites in Gyeongju, the root of Confucian culture, and learned about the many positive effects the city had on the Korean people. Taking such a trip with fellow students from many different countries also afforded participants the opportunity to share various countries' experiences in the quest for development.

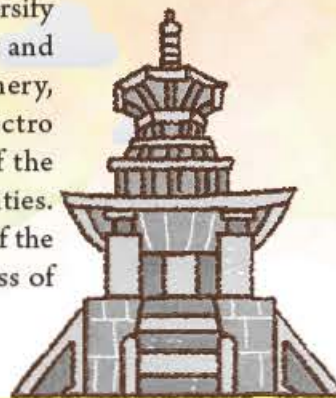
POSCO STEELWORKS

As the students visited the steelworks and the history museum of the Pohang Iron and Steel Company (POSCO), the company's rich history since it was founded in 1968 was immediately apparent; it has played a significant role in Korea's economic development. POSCO mainly manufactures building materials, basic household appliances (washing machines, doors, etc.), frames for cars, ships, and motors. POSCO serves as an example of Korean business that built itself from the ground up, and is now considered one of the world's top steelmakers.



HYUNDAI HEAVY INDUSTRIES

The History Hall of Hyundai Heavy Industries presents a story of perseverance and the importance of dreaming big. This was the ideal place to begin the tour, as the History Hall offered a portrait of Hyundai's transition from a mere start-up to becoming the conglomerate that it is today. The company has managed to diversify its initial output, shipbuilding, to now include industrial plant and engineering, offshore and engineering, engine and machinery, green energy businesses, construction equipment, and electro electric systems. Today, Hyundai Heavy Industries is one of the world's leading producers of large-scale machinery and facilities. The students were also pleased to participate in a guided tour of the Hyundai shipyard, where ships and vessels were in the process of being built.



DAEWANGAM

Located on Korea's eastern coast, the beautiful and serene tomb of King Munmu (r. 661–681) is another historical site that the students visited. The site comprises a large island with a rock formation resembling a dragon rising high up into the sky. It was easy to see how generations of Koreans have felt peace when visiting this place. Getting to the park only requires that visitors take a stone-paved path lined with a beautiful array of trees and shrubs, including cherry trees and tall pines. Looking out into the water, one can see the various rock islands connected by a bridge system that enables people to move from one island to another until they arrive at the furthest point out into the sea.



GYEONGJU CULTURAL HERITAGE

The Gyeongju Cultural Heritage is located in the southeastern city of Gyeongju, which once served as the capital of the Silla kingdom (57 BCE-935)—the longest-surviving kingdom in Korean history. The Gyeongju Cultural Heritage is the most popular field trip destination in Korea, owing to its role in the foundation of Silla era art, culture and tradition. Especially, there are a lot of great treasures that express the beauty of Buddhist art. This heritage site includes Bulguksa Temple and the Seokguram Grotto, which were registered as part of the UNESCO World Heritage List in 1995. Impressively, five of Gyeongju's districts have been registered as World Cultural Heritage sites, making this a must-visit destination in Korea. Gyeongju also offers the Cheonmachong Tomb in Daereungwon Tomb Complex, Cheomseongdae Observatory, the Gyeongju National Museum, the Anapji Pond, Bulguksa Temple, and the Seokguram Grotto.



2015 International Field Research and Study

From September 1st to 10th, Professor Jong-Il You and 32 Korean students of various backgrounds visited the European countries of the United Kingdom, France, Belgium, and Germany for the 2015 International Field Research and Study (IFRS). The main purpose of the IFRS was "Sustainable Development Policy and International Development Cooperation Cases of Europe." The program was thoroughly planned to visit well-known international organizations and schools which were even more enriched with active participation from students. Also, the program included several cultural visits.

The first destination was London, the capital city of the UK. In London, the students visited the Bank of England, Lloyd's building, and the Department for International Development (DfID), where they were given presentations respectively about monetary policy after the financial crisis, structure and operation of the insurance market, and sustainable development.

The students then moved to Paris, France to visit OECD and UNESCO to figure out a way to examine the subject of financing for development and partnering on development. A student of KDI School who is currently doing an internship at UNESCO accompanied them for most of the schedule in Paris and gave some useful tips to the students about internship opportunities.

In addition, the students visited ESSEC Business School where Professor Charles H. Cho, who gave a lecture at KDI School in July this year, presented "Corporate Social Responsibility Reporting in France." The ESSEC Business School is one of our partner schools that agreed to exchange their students each year through a dual degree program, GLIMPSE (Global Leaders in Management and Policy in South Korea and Europe). The team met with two KDI School students who are now studying at the ESSEC Business School and had lunch together. This meeting motivated the other students to

participate in the dual degree program next year.

Leaving behind the romantic city of Paris, the students moved to Brussel, Belgium, to visit the European Commission (EC) and KU Leuven, another partner institution of KDI School. At the EC, the students mainly learned the structure of the EU. They gained further knowledge about EU's foreign policy at the KU Leuven. The IFRS was finalized with the trip to Rudesheim, Germany, located in the UNESCO world heritage site of the Middle-Rhine valley.

According to the survey after the trip, the satisfaction rate of overall lectures was 97.8 percent, and that of contribution to personal development or career was 95.6 percent. The students were able to enhance their global competitiveness through understanding of the implications of sustainable development and observing the European way of life. Overall, it was such a meaningful experience for the students, as they could get along with one another regardless of their age or profession.



Marching into the World of Higher Education: 2015 EAIE Conference

From September 15th to 18th, KDI School participated in the European Association for International Education (EAIE) Conference held in Glasgow, Scotland. This year's conference was filled with 5,050 participants from 90 countries. Ms. Jaesoon Lee, Head of Student Affairs Division, and Ms. Sewon Lee from External Relations and Development Division participated in the conference.

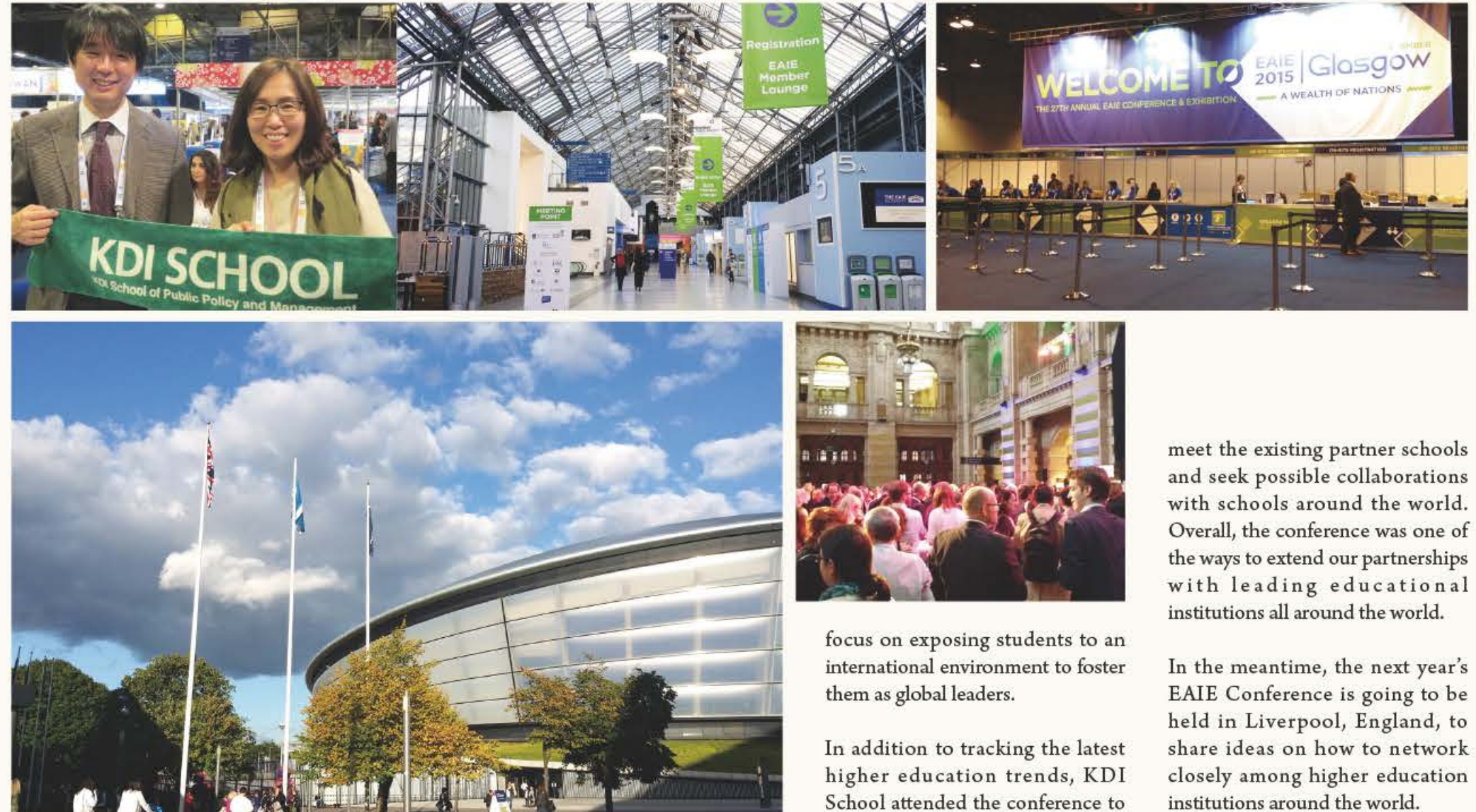
The conference's theme was "Wealth of Nations." The issue of wealth encouraged the participants to see the term from a variety of perspectives, from very specific questions of international higher education policy and the practice of more wide-ranging notions of power and privilege, as well as global civic responsibility and long-term environmental sustainability.

Some of the workshops offered during the conference explained the definition of internationalization in higher education, how to maximize

the networking skills to promote internationalization, and how to provide work placement for students.

The top five purposes of internationalization in higher education are i) to enhance the quality of education, ii) to enhance the quality of research, iii) to prepare students effectively for life and work in an inter-cultural and globalizing world, iv) to enhance the international reputation and visibility of the university, and v) to provide service to society and community social engagement.

To provide such services, those who work at the international office should maximize networking skills to build cooperation with overseas institutions. Last but not least, there was a workshop on how to effectively dispatch students for internships or work experience to overseas. The internationalization of education does not just include creating a diverse classroom environment but also should



focus on exposing students to an international environment to foster them as global leaders.

In addition to tracking the latest higher education trends, KDI School attended the conference to

meet the existing partner schools and seek possible collaborations with schools around the world. Overall, the conference was one of the ways to extend our partnerships with leading educational institutions all around the world.

In the meantime, the next year's EAIE Conference is going to be held in Liverpool, England, to share ideas on how to network closely among higher education institutions around the world.

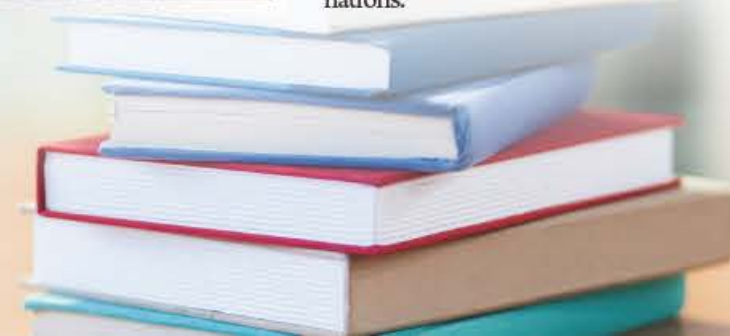

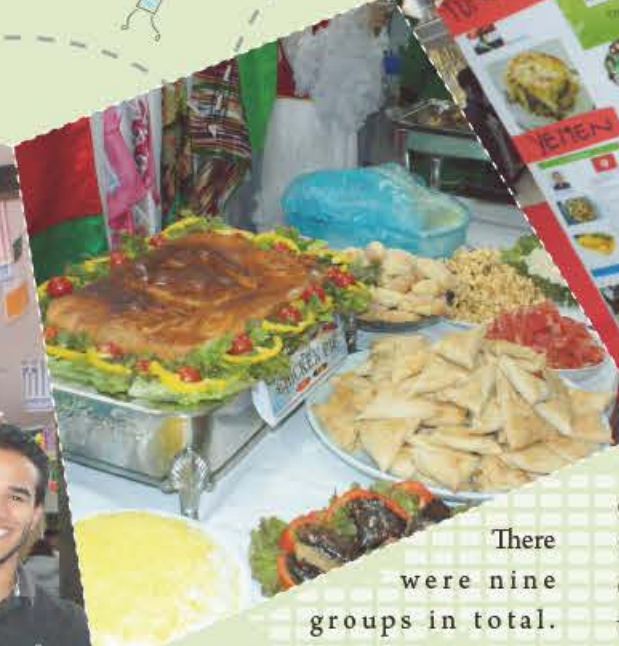

The menu of the café includes coffee drinks, non-coffee drinks, fresh fruit juices, vegetable juices, and tea. Coffee beans from Brazil, Honduras, Vietnam and Indonesia are used to provide a high-quality taste for customers. Additionally, the café provides a healthy bakery corner including sandwiches, hot dogs, salads, and homemade yogurt.



Since the café is next to the library, there was no doubt that this café would create a great environment by encouraging interaction with school members, as well as offering relaxing time after study and work. Sung Jin Choi, Director of the Central Library, stressed that the main goal was to open its own full-service café that would make school members' lives more convenient and avoid wasting time bringing food or drinks. The unique part of the café is that it is a nonprofit organization and offers jobs to increase social welfare of disabled people. This café will help disabled people to be involved in social activities and to increase their professional skills.

Health Care Room Opens at KDI School

A health care room is now open for KDI School. It is located near the entrance of KDI on the second floor. The open hours for the health care room are Monday to Friday, 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., except for national holidays (12 p.m.-1 p.m.: lunch hours).

KDI School Health Service Provides:

1. Medication: painkillers, digestive aid, anti-diarrhea/anti-constipation, nausea/vomiting, cold & cough relief, nasal inflammation, calamine lotion (itching and discomfort), muscle pain patches, burn treatment, eye drops, stomatitis treatment, etc.
2. Simple injury treatment or emergency treatment
3. Medication supply to dormitories
4. Recovery room
5. Prevention on epidemics
6. School events medical support
7. Health education

Medical Facilities

1. First-aid kit
2. Hot-Cold pack
3. Digital scale for height/weight body mass index
4. Sphygmomanometer
5. Blood sugar analyzer
6. Digital thermometer

Ms. Min Gyeong Yang, part of the nursing staff of KDI School, offers over-the-counter medication, basic medical services and simple treatments for any health issue. Care is offered on a walk-in basis, so there is no need to make an appointment. The health care service also provides online counseling for specific medical advice or assistance via email. It is highly recommended for the international students to have an online counseling session with the nursing staff before visiting the hospital. You can also email the health care service with any questions you have regarding your health or check-up results (healthcare@kdis.ac.kr).

Since the weather has gotten cold, people tend to stay inside and become passive. If this inactive state maintained through winter, it could cause a decline in health. Ms. Yang provided four ways to stay healthy in winter.

① Stretch frequently

It is helpful for the prevention of muscle pain and the promotion of digestion if you relax your muscles often. Also, stretching will help your resistance to stress.

② Drink enough water

Drink more than 1.5L of water daily. It will help moisturize your skin and prevent respiratory disease.

③ 30 minutes sunbathing every day

There are many people who will lack vitamin D. Sunbathing will not only play a significant role in your bones but will also lower your risk of cancer, prevent metabolic syndrome, and enhance the level of immunity.

④ Ventilate interior every few hours

Hazy interior air reduces blood circulation, which can cause dry cough or colds. Ventilate rooms filled with fine dust and pollutants to prevent respiratory disease.

CAMPUS Asia Program, Yusuke Kimura from GRIPS

CAMPUS Asia is a dual-degree program where students can take classes and earn credits and/or an additional degree in Japan or China. Designed to promote cooperation among Northeast Asian universities, CAMPUS Asia allows our students to enjoy the rare experience of living and studying in the three Northeast Asian countries.

Mr. Yusuke Kimura is an exchange student from the National Graduate Institute for Policy Studies (GRIPS) in Japan through CAMPUS Asia program. Mr. Kimura previously studied at KDI School's Seoul campus in 2014, and he came back to study at the Sejong campus. Please continue reading to find out why he decided to come back to KDI School!

Please tell me something about yourself and where you are from.

Hello, my name is Yusuke Kimura, and I belong to the Infrastructure Development Policy Program from GRIPS. I have worked in the New Business Development and Public Relations Department from the East Nippon Expressway Company. It is a state-owned company in Japan that constructs and operates highways.

I heard this is your second time at KDI School. What made you come back to KDI School?

Yes, I participated in the KDI School's summer program last year for only one month in Seoul. I wanted to study abroad even longer ever since, and I knew KDI School was a perfect opportunity when I heard that KDI School would be relocating to Sejong City.

How does KDI School differ from GRIPS?

GRIPS is divided into two programs: domestic and international programs. I am part of the domestic program, so all of my classes from GRIPS were taught in Japanese for Japanese students. In this regard, KDI School's environment is nothing like GRIPS. I believe that one of the biggest strengths of KDI School is the rich educational curriculum based on an international perspective and an international environment.



How do you like Korea and Sejong City?

Sejong is a newly built city and shows many changes that I can learn from. Parts of the transportation system, such as the Bus Rapid Transit (BRT), road management (roundabout and traffic circle) and cycling lanes, are very interesting.

This is definitely something rarely seen in Japan, because the decision-making procedure would take a long time from the start. I love the national library in Sejong City and the environment for kids and the child care. I would love to move to Sejong and live with my family if I get a job here.

Why did you decide to study in Korea?

Korea successfully concluded its FTA negotiations with the United States and the European Union. The growing interest from South Korea to join the Trans-Pacific Partnership makes me want to learn about the FTA trend in Korea, as I believe that investment in roads and rail infrastructure is vital for a country's future growth.

What do you see yourself doing in the future?

In the future, I would like to pursue a career in exporting infrastructure, such as toll roads. I believe that my experiences at KDI School, including learning and having discussions in my classes and developing relationships with the international student community, will have a great impact on my future career.

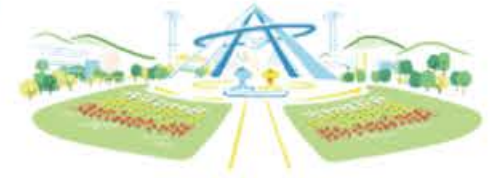

Visit to Yuseong District, Daejeon Metropolitan City

The Yuseong local government in Daejeon City invited KDI School international students to a one-day field trip on October 16th. Min-Beom Park (2006 MPP, Korea), who is a Director of Education & Science at Yuseong District Office, put an effort to make this visit meaningful for current KDI School students. The students had an opportunity to learn about the district's political and research infrastructure. They were also able to experience the area's cultural history by visiting the Yuseong-gu District Office, the Yurim Park Chrysanthemum Festival, the

Yuseong Hot Spring Foot Bath Experience Plaza, the Geological Museum at the Korea Institute of Geoscience and Mineral Resources and the Korea Institute of Machinery and Materials.



Yuseong-gu became well known as a hub of science and technology since 1973 when the Daedeok Science Town was established. It is also famous for its 1,000-year-old hot spring, which

was designated as a special tourism district in 1994. Yuseong-gu has become an international destination for hot spring baths.

Yurim Park, situated in front of the Yuseong-gu Office, is a beautiful park with many flowers, themed sculptures and assortments of chrysanthemums in various designs. It has trees, pavilions, a multipurpose grass plaza and, of course, has a very bright, colorful flower garden. It is indeed a magnificent place of beauty.

The Korea Institute of Machinery and Materials was established in 1976. This institute became a pioneer in machinery technology as a state-funded research organization, part of the ongoing search for advanced technologies to develop.

The Geological Museum at the Korea Institute of Geoscience and Mineral Resources is the country's first and only museum dedicated to geology. The main hall is packed with fossils and other dinosaur-related items and exhibits about 2,000 specimens of minerals and rocks. It holds a large, 7-meter-wide globe and has dinosaur models of the tyrannosaurus and Maiasaura, as well as housing the Duwon meteorite, which is the only stony meteorite in Korea. In this museum, geological samples have been accumulated over the years through consistent research projects and the collection was established to promote understanding and support for the geological field.

Only two alumni, Anna Kristina Pettersson, originally from Sweden, and Muhammad Ali Theyab Al-Ageeli, originally from Iraq, were able to come. We chatted for almost two hours over a modest dinner and some beer at a pub near the Korean Embassy. Although there were altogether ten alumni residing in London, most of them could not make it because of the short notice. Nonetheless, the meeting was very valuable as it revealed quite a lot about what KDI School meant for some of our alumni. I was pleasantly surprised.

First are the stories Anna related to us. After finishing her MBA in 2005, she had gone to Bangladesh to assist Professor Stan Sakai in setting up his financial operations. This led to her working also in Singapore, and eventually in London, where she has been with Brummer & Partners for four years. Anna told me that her entire professional career had depended on the education and connections provided her by KDI School. Muhammad told us that Sarah hadn't been able to come because she was busy with their three children, including a five-month-old baby. He has been doing his Ph. D. studies in petroleum engineering in London for three years. He is expecting to finish his dissertation on inhibiting wax formation within the pipelines that go through cold seawaters by next year.

Anna and Muhammad were curious about what has happened to KDI School after they left, including the closing of the MBA program and the relocation to Sejong City. Apparently, they were keeping up with at least the most important parts of school news. We also discussed ways to help the alumni stay in touch with each other and KDI School more easily through social media as well as off-line gatherings. Anna and Muhammad promised to initiate a meeting of the London-based alumni sooner or later. By this time, Hyunjoo and I, still suffering from jet lag, were quite exhausted after a long day that had included visits to the Bank of England and the British Museum, among others. Reluctantly, we said good-bye and parted with our friends.

2015 International Alumni Essay Contest

The winners of the 2015 Alumni Essay Contest, with short summaries of their essays, are as follows:



1st Place: Yanti Marlina (2010 MPP/PM, Indonesia)

The background of my education is in the field of land transportation... After completing my education at KDI School, I got a scholarship from the Netherlands Government for Post Graduate Diploma Program in Urban Planning and Management in 2011... KDI School has helped me to enrich my understanding and the point of view towards a certain problem not only from technical but also from social or economic aspects... I worked for the central government whose primary tasks are formulating policy by providing guidelines related to land transportation for local governments... Afterward, in 2012, I got a promotion to another sub-division with the tasks of formulating policies regarding vehicle periodical testing and its approval... I was responsible for compiling data base, formulating technical guidelines, joining and preparing material for international meeting related to ASEAN and Asia Pacific level... In Indonesia, we adopt a decentralized government for the field of land transport. Thus, the Ministry of Transportation serves as the central government so it has responsibilities for giving instructions, directions, policies, and guidelines on land transportation... Our organization is also working with the Government of Korea, KOTI - Korea Transport Institute. Every year, we have a program to do a seminar related to vehicle periodical testing in cooperation with KOTI... Early 2015, I got a promotion in inland waterways transport division... I handle tasks related to the safety of inland waterways, determining inland waterways class, dredging river and lake... I think Jakarta also needs another policy package that has to be applied simultaneously to create a good transportation system just as what Seoul city already did in the past... Recently, I got offers to become an auditor at the Ministry of Transport and to become lecturer at the Graduate School of Land Transport beginning next semester in 2016...

2nd Place: Tomas Antonio Guardia (2014 MPP, Panama)

I completed the coursework for the MPP program at KDI School in December 2014 and went back to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MOFA) of Panama... Many opportunities opened up for me at MOFA, taking into account the academic experience in such prestigious institute of South Korea. Once back in Panama in January, I was assigned as an advisor to the General Directorate of Multilateral Affairs... I presented my contributions to the ongoing process of the Vice-President and Minister of Foreign Affairs to reform the national law that organizes MOFA and the diplomatic career... I have encouraged my colleagues at the International Cooperation Directorate General of MOFA to promote the enrollment of Panamanian officials to the academic programs of KDI School...



2nd Place: Bashdar Hamza Jalal (2010 MPP/PM, Iraq)
