

- Using an interdisciplinary approach, this course uses traditional and modern insights from both economics and politics to develop essential skills needed in policy-making.
- The MA Public Policy is designed to give you the tools to understand and assess a wide range of public policy issues.

YOUR PROGRAMME OF STUDY



January-March (Spring Term):

- 60 credits of optional modules: generally 2 modules
- start planning for Capstone or Placement
- start planning for dissertation

April to June (Summer Term):

- Exams for modules taken in Spring Term
- Work on Capstone or Placement
- Continue work on dissertation

July to September (our of term):

- Continue work on dissertation
- Submission of Capstone or Placement projects

October to December (Autumn Term):

- Two Core modules: Economics of PP and Politics of PP
- Submission of dissertation



PLACEMENT OR CAPSTONE PROJECT?

Placement

- 20 credits
- Students select PIM92
- Spend at least 70 hours at placement host (external organisation) typically:
 - a ½ or 1 day per week for a number of weeks
 - or full time from summer term
- Write up a placement project based on experience gained of 3,000-4,000 words by mid-Sept

Capstone Project

- 20 credits
- Students select ECM200
- Part of student project team with meetings with Capstone organisation
- Complete group project plus in some cases a presentation for the organisation
- An academic will supervise the project
- Project timings depend on organisation – typically between mid Jan and August
- Individual submission by mid-Sept



PLACEMENT SEARCH

- School provides help and advice on placement applications
- The student makes speculative applications to possible hosts

Reflect and decide	What kind of placement you would like? What back up options you might need to identify?
Research	Information sources to identify the names of contacts and who to approach
Design	Your cover letter and CV
Begin to apply	As soon as possible
Manage	The process & keep it on track by following up your applications- identifying new leads until you find your placement

PLACEMENT ADMINISTRATION University of Reading

School will arrange:

Placement Agreement

Signed by the University and the host

Health and Safety Form

Completed by host, so we can risk assess your placement as safe for you

Student Confidentiality letter

- You may encounter confidential information whilst on placement
- By signing this letter you are confirming that you will not disclose any **confidential** information to the press, friends ,family or ANYONE!
- The UoR can only recognise the placement as part of the module if these three three forms are complete and the organisation meets the University requirements



CAPSTONE

- Students work in a small group overseen by an academic supervisor
- Students complete a project on behalf of a client
- Module aims to give the students an opportunity to synthetize and apply their knowledge
- Students will prepare an output depending on the organisations requirements, for example a report or a presentation
- Individually students will have to submit a written report on their project of 3,000 words

ADMISSION ETC.



- Apply from Spring onwards: we can consider until late Autumn
- No need to submit a statement of purpose.
- IELTS (or equivalent): 6.5 overall (no element < 5.5)
- If less, you can take pre-sessional English programme
- Pre-arrival information and session
- Welcome event and registration in January
- Programme Director as Tutor


Off Campus


Socialising:
