COURSE DESCRIPTION

The main objective of this course is to prepare students to write research papers and dissertations. Students will be introduced to the practices and conventions of academic writing. The content of this course is intended to prepare students to be researchers and write confidently for an academic audience. In short, this course is a crash course in how to shape your research and present it appropriately. This will be an intensive six-week course, so please think carefully about your overall course load before you take this class; students are expected to steadily produce written output over the entire six-week period.

Previous students have used this class as an opportunity to write substantial parts of their dissertations or SRPs. Students are free to use the class assignments as a way to develop their writing in other courses.

The class will focus on the following areas:

- Academic Integrity
 - Avoiding plagiarism
 - Appropriate use of references
 - Paraphrasing and summarizing
 - > APA/CMS citations and bibliography
- Research Skills
 - Developing a thesis statement
 - Developing suitable research questions

- Conducting a literature review
- Structure
 - > The overall structure of a research paper
 - Paragraph structure
 - Connecting paragraphs
 - Sentence structure
- Academic Register (Style)
 - Writing in a formal style
 - Writing with academic modesty (qualifying language)
- Academic Authority
 - Expressing an opinion or point of view (making a claim)
 - > Awareness of the strengths or limitations of your work
- Grammar and Punctuation
 - > Common errors including use of tense, articles, and subject-verb agreement

- ② Students will provide peer feedback on assignments in three group editing workshops. These guided workshops are an important part of the graduate level writing process. Students will have opportunities to develop self-criticism as writers.

Students will occasionally be given writing exercises in class taken from a range of English for academic purposes (EAP) textbooks. The books listed below are recommended as supplementary reading.  - A final research paper comprised of an introduction, literature review, main body, and conclusion due **15/06/2017** (2,500-5,000 words)

• Oral Presentation (10%)

- > Students will give a presentation on the topic of their research paper.
- Class Participation (5%)
 - Students are expected to complete in-class writing activities and participate in discussion.
- Attendance (5%)
 - Absences must be excused; you should provide supporting evidence to excuse an absence.
